Pre-1841

Leonora Cannon and her cousin Elizabeth Kaighin were the first Manx converts joining the church in Canada on 9 May 1836. Leonora had emigrated to Canada c1832¹ and Elizabeth later joined her there. They moved to join the main body of the saints in the USA c1837/8² as Leonora's husband John Taylor was about to be appointed an apostle.

¹¹ MII Unfortunately the ship's passenger manifest does not give origins. The passengers Manx origins can be confirmed. The Cowleys and Tarbets in Our Pioneer Heritage, Vol. 16, p.506/7 and 510. Ann Faragher is listed in MII as Farquer. She later married William Edward Kelly and her Manx origins are shown on her tombstone. The Bolts and Kellys can be found on the 1841 census. All the Manx passengers are listed together on the customs record and it is highly likely that Mary Hall age 17 who appears between Ann Faragher and Ann Bolt is Manx. However she does not appear on the 1841 census though there is a Mary Hales of the same age.

¹² Reminiscences of Matthias Cowley, p.1 This is the only known mention of this voyage and only the year of the sailing is known. Isabelle Ann Cowley is not mentioned on the MII but there is no evidence that she did not emigrate with her family. She was to get married while at Council Bluffs. Matthias came back to the British Isles as a missionary returning to the US on 25.04.1857 on the ship Westmoreland.

¹³ Our Pioneer Heritage, Vol. 16, p.509 + p516 and other sources are consistent in giving the year of emigration as 1844. MII gives only a few passengers of the Fanny including the William Watson family, which may be the anglicised version of Watterson.

Unlike other passengers listed there is no description of age, employment or origins. Another list of the passengers manifest does not include any of the Pitchforth family see

¹⁹ John Thomas Caine emigrated on the ship Shanunga 17.03.1846 see LDS Biographical Encyclopedia, Vol. 1, p.726. Though he first heard the gospel in Peel he did not emigrate on a Mormon sponsored ship and joined the church in New York. He visited the Isle Of Man in 1875 but I can find no record of his return to America.

²⁰ On 27 June 1844 non-members opposed to the church murdered the leaders of the church, the Prophet Joseph Smith and his brother Hyrum Smith. Following their deaths increasing mob action and the failure of the state to reliably defend church members made it increasingly clear that Mormon settlements in Illinois were unsustainable. In early 1846, the majority of the Latter Day Saints left these settlements and the massive undertaking to move church membership with no outside support over 1200 miles to unsettled territory began. This is the reason why emigration ceased from early 1845 until 1849 by which time the main body of the church was established in the Rocky Mountains.

The custom's list alongside Edward's name gives the following passengers who have Manx surnames: John Calister (Edward's surname is also spelt this way) age 27; Charles Cowley age 20 and Charles Cain age 21. These may well be Manx but I cannot prove it, as may also be another passenger Hannah Cowley age 19.

²⁵ MII. Hannah Comish is probably a transcription error as there was no Hannah in the Comish family. This was Jane according to family accounts (the oldest child age 19 see Our Pioneer Heritage, Vol. 16, p.524 et seq.) though Elizabeth age 14 was the closest to the age given in the MMI.

²⁶ MII Cathrine joined the church in Manchester and emigrated from there with her children who were not Manx born.

²⁷ Was down to emigrate on Argo 10.01.1850 but listed as deposit returned. Returned to British Isles three times firstly following his wife's death in 1853 and then for two missions returning to America on: Juventa 31.05.1855; Manhattan 23.09.1869; and Wisconsin 31.08.1889. He appears on emigrant lists four times in total.

²⁸ MII William Cottier and the Quirks origin is given as Liverpool. There is no William Cottier on the 1841 census for England that has the right birth year but the census for the Isle Of Man has two William Cottiers with the right birth year and of these two the one listed in the parish of Onchan has the same occupation as given on the MII viz. stonemason. The Quirks on the other hand moved to Liverpool soon after their marriage according to family accounts and joined the church there.

²⁹ MII. Thomas Gracey is listed as Thomas G Boyd but he is in fact the nephew of Jane and John Boyd.

³⁰ They emigrated at sometime between 30 March 1851 (when the 1851 Isle of Man census was held which shows them living at Onchan) and 17 July 1852 when Joseph dies at New Orleans showing the family had arrived there. Family records give the wrong emigration year (see <http://www.members.tripod.com/~dlarsen/larsen/histories/comish.html>) believing William Comish's emigration to have been in 1849 when it was actually 1850 and that the rest of the family emigrated a couple of years later in 1851. They also state that the rest of the family emigrated on the Ellen Marie however they are not listed on the passenger lists for this ship. If they did sail on the Ellen Marie then they should have been listed on the 10.02.1852 sailing arriving New Orleans 5.04.1852, for this is the only one that fits this time frame as the 1851 sailing left before the Manx census took place.

³¹ MII. Eleanor Lawson was also listed in the British Mission Register as about to emigrate when she was 26 which is presumably 4 years earlier. James Quayle is listed as coming from Ashton under Lyne where he had been working to raise money. Thomas Rimmer returned to the British Isles and emigrated again on the ship Juventa leaving 31.03.1855.

³² MII. They all given on the customs manifest as being from the Isle Of Man though the Church records and MII often give Liverpool. The two William Creers is not a mistake. They are both listed together on the customs listing though only one is shown on the MII. One is William the son of Elizabeth age 18 described as a carpenter. The other is a cousin described as a ropemaker. The 1851 Manx census has a William Creer living at 3 Fort Anne Road, Douglas age 16-occupation apprentice ropemaker. His father Thomas is an uncle of William. According to family tradition the son William would not emigrate unless his cousin would also. Jane Scarff is shown on the 1851 census as a niece of Ellen Gelling.

³³ MII

³⁴ Not listed on MII but listed on customs register. 1860 census and family records indicate that she was born on the Isle Of Man.

³⁵ MII Ann and Sarah Ritson emigrated with the rest of their immediate family but they were the only ones born on the Isle of Man. They were living in Birkenhead when they emigrated and probably joined the church there though an earlier conversion on the Isle Of Man cannot be ruled out. Ann was on the Isle of Man at the 1841 census but I have not been able to locate the rest of the family on any census.

³⁶ MII. Emigrated with wife. MII gives Liverpool as origin and notes on MII state he had just been President of the Reading Conference but he did join the church on the Isle Of Man.

³⁷ MII. Henry emigrated with his family. The family are listed twice on the MII, under the surname Clucies and again under the surname Lucas. Though born on the Island Henry appears to have left early and joined the church elsewhere. Family records show he lived in Staffordshire. They emigrated from Glasgow. Ann joined the church on the Isle Of Man but emigrated from Huddersfield where she had moved because of family opposition. MII gives her surname as Killup.

³⁸ MII. The MII indicates that the Brown sisters were all listed on different pages of the British Mission Registers and spells Elizabeth's surname with an 'e' but descendants are very definite that they were sisters. Though origin is shown as England they came from the Isle Of Man. The Hunters are not on the Isle of Man census' but can be found on the 1851 census at Preston which gives James, Catherine and children George, John and Catherine as being born on the Island The children's birth dates would place the family as being on the island till c. 1841-2. The MII gives them as being from England but they may have returned to the Isle of Man before emigrating as "The Life History of John Jaques" states for 29th May 1856 "The measles appeared in two children of James Hunter, from the Isle of Man." Also the Deseret News 15 Oct 1856 announced the arrival in Salt Lake City of George and John Hunter from the Isle Of Man. If they did emigrate from The Isle Of Man a further four children should be added to the above list.

³⁹ MII. Matthew who was born on the Isle Of Man emigrated with his family from Calcutta, India. It was while serving with the British army in India that Matthew joined the church.

⁴⁰ MII. Origin is given as England, but she was born on the Isle of Man as the 1880 Utah census return shows. It is unclear where she joined the church but her husband William also came from the Isle of Man and his obituary states that he joined the church in his youth. They moved to Liverpool shortly after their marriage and her son was born there. She emigrated with her son William Jnr who is called John W on the 1880 census. Her husband also emigrated arriving in Utah in 1861 but I can find no emigration details for him.

⁴¹ During this period the Utah war took place when President Johnston sent the U. S. army to confront the members of the church and ensure American control of Utah. This came as a shock to church members who had not realised that they were in rebellion. While there was no actual fighting emigration was disrupted and there are no known Isle Of Man emigrants during this period

⁴² The American Civil war took place from 1861-1865 and again made emigration difficult.

⁴³ MII. Christian was a popular girls name on the island. It is anglicised on the MII to Christinia.

⁴⁴ Not listed on MII. The diary of Joseph Lawson during his mission to Great Britain under 5 May 1867 mentions a letter from "sister Robinson ...informing me that her son John was going to Utah to start on the 8th". John's sister Jane Robinson Hindley in her diary under the date 1 January 1868 states "My brother John has come to this country..".

⁴⁵ MII. Elizabeth's origin is given as England but she is probably the sister of Mary Ann Cowley Quirk who marries Thomas Henry Clark senior in 1869 in Grantsville where Mary Ann lived.

⁴⁶ MII. Mona is listed as coming from Manchester but she was born in Ramsey see Family search (AFN: 1TFW-0S)

A Mrs James May is also listed on the MII as emigrating on the ship Abyssnia in 1883 with no age or date of sailing given.
